







Physical Distancing Guidelines



 If possible, the same parent/caregiver should drop off and pick up the child every day. Consider designating a staff member from each class to scort in or out of facility.



Keep each child's bedding separate, and consider storing in individually labeled bins, cubbies, or bags.

Ask parents/caregivers to meet at the facility entryway for pick-up

and drop-off Arrange developmentally appropriate activities for smaller group activities and rearrange furniture and play spaces to maintain 6 feet of separation, when possible.

• For napping, place cots, cribs, and mats 6 feet apart, with heads in

opposite directions Offer more opportunities for individual play. Plan activities that do

not require close physical contact between multiple children.

Develop spacing instructions in both indoor and outdoor spaces that are developmentally appropriate and easy for children to

Personal Hygiene

- Implement and enforce strict handwashing guidelines for all staff and children. Wash hands for 20 seconds with soap, rubbing thoroughly after application, and use paper towels (or single use cloth towels) to dry hands thoroughly. It may be helpful to sing a 20-second song while children wash.
- Use bathroom time as an opportunity to reinforce healthy habits and monitor proper handwashing.
- Install hand sanitizers, out of the reach of children, near all entry doors and other high traffic areas.
- Teach children to avoid contact with one's eyes, nose and mouth, and use tissue to wipe their nose and to cough/sneeze inside their
- Discontinue brushing teeth during class

- Each time the child participates in hands-on routine activity, they continually refine their coordination, self control and sense of order through repetition of the sequence of actions.
- Children ask for help to help themselves; the sense of accomplishment comes from performing the task themselves.
- Positive Descriptive Acknowledgements (PDA) adds language to actions (parallel talk) and helps children attain self efficacy instead of competing for adult praise.

- Aprons and their use: Children need to manage aprons on their own.
- Aprons can be generic colors, or match the exercise.
- Cotton is recommended & If they get wet, this is an opportunity to change clothes.
- an opportunity to change clothes.
 Dish towels 100% cotton- thick and absorbent.
- Measure the towel into thirds, then fold down one third horizontally from the top, then fold in half vertically. Cut a wedge at the center corner for the head hole.
- Towel mitts: cut wash rags in half and sew one side closed.
- Hanging towels: sew ring in middle or at corner
